

First-Saturday Birding Trips 2015-2016

Mark your calendars with the following dates for this season's bird walks. Most trips end by noon and do not require much walking. Remember to bring your binoculars, scopes, field guides, insect repellent, raingear, snacks and water.

Unless otherwise announced, all trips depart from the parking lot of the BridgePointe Hotel at 7am sharp. Carpools can be arranged as we meet up. The planned destination may be changed at the last minute if a special sighting or different trip gives us a better opportunity for birding. Information will be updated with each newsletter.

Annual Pea Island Field Trip

The overnight Pea Island field trip has been set for Wednesday and Thursday, November 11 & 12, 2015. This has always been a splendid trip and is one of the advantages of membership in our bird club.

We will depart from the BridgePointe Hotel at 7:00 am Wednesday and return by mid-to-late afternoon on Thursday. For members departing from points east of New Bern, we will meet you at 8:00 am at the Liberty gas station on Rt 264 in Washington (about 3 blocks after turning off onto Highway 264).

The route for this year's trip will be the same as previous trips. We will stop by the Bald Eagle capital of North Carolina at Roper. Next, we will look for sparrows near Lake Phelps and then check out water birds on the lake itself. Then, it's on to the Alligator River Wildlife Refuge for raptors and waterfowl. From there we will go to Nag's Head and quickly check into the motel. Late afternoon will be at the always productive and beautiful pond at Bodie Island. Finally, there will be a social hour followed by dinner at nearby restaurants. After an early breakfast at our motel, we will check out and drive to Pea Island National Wildlife Refuge, which usually has an interesting assortment of waterfowl, wading birds and shorebirds. By late morning on Thursday, we will begin the long route home with a stop at the Mattamuskeet National Wildlife Refuge.

Plan to bring food and beverage for your lunch on Wednesday and a snack on Thursday. You might also like to bring something to share at happy hour.

The weather on the Outer Banks is always unpredictable, so check the weather forecast in planning what to wear, but do wear rubber-soled shoes.

Our motel is once again the Comfort Inn South at Nags Head. The rates obtained for club members are \$70 for a landside room and \$80 for oceanfront. **Reservations must be made by Friday, October 30.** Call the hotel at 252-441-6315 and identify yourself as a member of the "New Bern Bird Club" in order to receive the special rate.

A Bear Walk with Mike Campbell

Minutes From October 2015

President Bob Gould welcomed 25 members and summarized the plan for the November 7th bird walk at Simmons Street Park. Bob reminded the club that submissions for the newsletter are due to Carol Oldham on the 15th day of the month as the target day to disseminate it is the 25th.

There was a discussion about a trip to Pea Island in the week of November 9th. In a show of hands, many members indicated that they were interested in this trip. Planning will begin with details to follow.

Carol & Jim Oldham will be hosting Falconer Chip Gentry with his owls, hawks, and eagles at their Wild Birds Unlimited store in New Bern on October 24th and invited club members to attend. The event is part of their celebration of the sixth anniversary of ownership of the store.

As a reminder, Olwen Jarvis is hosting the club's Annual Christmas Party on Sunday, December 6th.

The program for this meeting was a talk on Kenya and its wildlife. Bob introduced the guest speaker, Sam Bland, who is a retired ranger and park superintendent for the North Carolina Division of Parks and Recreation. Presently, Sam works for the Coastal Federation and involves himself in environmental education and restoration. Sam traveled to Kenya to attend wildlife photographer David Lloyd's Big Cat Photo Safari. Thus, the focus of the safari was to photograph the Masai Mara's famous lions, leopards and cheetahs alongside elephants, giraffe, zebra hippo, rhino, and other renowned African wildlife. However, the Masai Mara also has over 450 species of birds, more than 50 of which are raptors, and there are safari offerings in Kenya for birders to see them. The photographs of the wildlife and landscapes in Sam's presentation were stunningly beautiful. All agreed that this was a very entertaining and informative program.

Since the weather forecast on our first trip was for winds: 10 to 20 mph and heavy rains, we had a very low turnout, only three birders showed: Bob Gould, Daniel Kendrick (new member), and Al Gamache. However, the actual weather we had was winds: light and variable, and no precipitation at all.

On 03 October 2015, would you believe, right in the midst of our ongoing monsoon season, with coastal flood warnings every day, up and down the East Coast, that the forecast for our Saturday Bird Walk was soft winds and sunny skies, and that's exactly what we had. But once again, we had a low turnout, a threesome: Mike Brooks, Chandra Biggerstaff, and yours truly Al Gamache. (24" of rain in Charleston? – is that believable ?!).

I'm simply going to combine our quarry trips, and type out a full species list. I would also like to note that I was particularly pleased with the several **Magnolia**

Warblers that we got, considering that we had had no luck in finding that species on our Spring Mountain Trip this year.

A Note from Carol & Keith Martin

Carol wrote from their new home in Vero Beach, Florida last August...

We are still settling in here... lots of stuff still in storage. We'll wait until it gets a little cooler to tackle the storage units. We overlook a long pond which has great bird life. And yes, also an alligator (dubbed Izod). The CCRC is a wildlife sanctuary (and official hurricane shelter) and at the end of the pond there is a long rookery. At night there are hundreds of ibis, anhingas, herons and egrets nesting in the bushes there (great and little blue, snowies, cattle, tricolored, etc.) It's quite a sight. Some of them fish down at our end of the pond so we can see them. We've had visits by wood storks (big) and Pinkie (a spoon bill that hangs out with the Great Egret). The anhingas are fun to watch. If the fish they catch are too feisty they beat them against the beach until they behave. My favorites

are the black bottomed whistling ducks with their big reddish beaks and bright pink legs. And they do whistle when they fly over. We spend far too much time watching from our windows. The moor hens have babies (this is their 2nd batch of 2) and have been working hard to keep them away from the turtles.

We don't seem to have birds like the buntings, humming, titmice, etc. Maybe it's too hot.

Carol also indicated that they were doing well and headed to Maine at the end of August.

Directions To Olwen & Bill Jarvis's Home

5620 Gondolier Drive, Fairfield Harbour (252-637-7748)

From Route 55 East:

- 1. At the **Handy Mart** traffic light, ~2 miles east of the Neuse River Bridge on NC 55, turn onto **Broad Creek Road**.
- 2. Continue ~6 miles. Go past the firehouse of Fairfield Harbour on the left.
- 3. Turn right between the fountains and flagpoles onto Cassowary Lane.
- 4. Stop at the guardhouse; tell the guards you are guests of the Jarvis's for the Bird Club party.
- 5. Proceed straight ahead a very short distance to a 4-way stop.
- 6. Take a right onto Caracara Drive.
- 7. At the 4th left, turn left onto **Pelican Drive**.
- 8. Continue to 4-way stop. GO STRAIGHT!
- 9. Turn left onto Trade Winds Road (this becomes Gondolier Drive).
- 10. Continue on to **Gondolier Drive**. # 5620 is on the right.
- 11. Park in the driveway or along the shoulder of the road NOT on the grass in the yard.
